

Five Finger Position

Bonus! Since all keys in this arrangement fall within 5-key spans, you never have to shift hand positions, which reduces the likelihood of errors.

Just keep your eyes on the music and press down the indicated fingers when you come to them.



Parallel Motion

In Measures 9 & 10, the Leftand Right-Hand fingers move in the *same* direction: up together, down together, etc.

Instead of trying to focus on both hands, "tell" your LH fingers to follow along with whatever the RH fingers do.

Tip: Both *pointer* fingers play at the same times.
